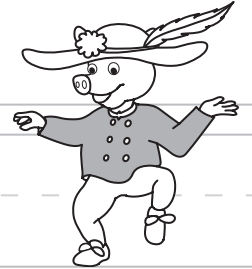

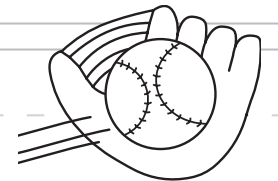

LEAD-IN ACTIVITY SUGGESTIONS

1. Prepare short sentences on sentence strips and cut them apart. Place each sentence in separate bags. Review the following concepts:
 - a. A sentence tells a complete thought.
 - b. All sentences start with a capital letter.
 - c. Telling sentences end with a period.
2. Students will take turns putting sentences together like a puzzle by choosing a word and taping it onto the board for all to see.
3. Direct attention to the Sentence Safari activity on Starfall.com.

EXTENSION ACTIVITY SUGGESTIONS

1. Write sentences on the board, beginning with lowercase letters and with missing punctuation. Provide magnifying glasses if available, or pre-cut paper magnifying glasses for students to use. Students become detectives, using their magnifying glasses to locate and then make the needed corrections (capital letter, period).

ADDITIONAL NOTES

1. **ESL and Special Education:** Review numbers 1-3 at the top of the worksheet. Point to pictures on the right of sentences reviewing ESL vocabulary. Students trace sentences. Read sentences together one at a time (pointing to words as you read), pausing and asking students what they need to do to fill in the boxes correctly.
