

We recommend reading these books after or alongside Starfall's popular "Learn-to-Read" phonics series featuring Zac the RatTM and other tales.

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
The No-Tail Cat or, I Like What I Am

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





Look at me.

Where is it?









You look funny without it.





But you are not pretty.

We do not want you.


















And look here.


Here is a little one.

This one is little, too. See where it is. It is up, up, up. Now here is one that looks funny. But it is good to work with. Work, work, work.






And look at this one.

The babies can have a ride.




This is a big, big one.

Red and yellow and blue.







Tails are big.





She developed her knack for writing exciting books for beginning readers during her 34 years as a first-grade teacher. She continued writing into her '90s, and published over eighty books for children. Margaret's use of a controlled vocabulary of high-frequency words helps children gain confidence and reading fluency. Her wonderful stories spark their interest.

Margaret earned a teaching degree from Wayne State University in 1948, after completing a nursing degree in 1944 at the University of Michigan. In addition to writing children's books, Margaret authored a book of poetry for adults, wrote magazine articles, gave lectures, and always found time to read to children at her local library. In 1993, Margaret won a prestigious award from the Woman's National Book Association for her contribution to early reading, but believed her biggest reward to be the three generations of students whom she taught to read.

Margaret passed away in 2014.
